## Reconciliation

April 2023

Some Outlook readers may know that we have 2 cats — an elderly Siamese boy, and a 9-month old black female kitten. Unfortunately, the 2 are incompatible and even after 6 months or so, they still hate each other. We have tried to reconcile them, and brought them together on numerous occasions, but they both go straight into attack mode and there is a lot of 'cat swearing'. So we have an elaborate dance of moving them, morning and evening, to different parts of the house. Their natural instinct is to see each other as bitter enemies.

With us humans, it can sometimes feel very hard to step over the walls and barriers we have built up against people we don't get on with, people we dislike, people we fear, or even hate. We may end up thinking of them as 'the other'. For example, the row over immigrants is often characterized in such terms: 'they' don't belong; 'they' come here to take our jobs, and so on.

doing the Difference Course, run by our vicar, Revd Barry Jackson, over the past few weeks, have looked at ways of bridging barriers we hold against others, by being curious: looking to learn the point of view of those we avoid, or fear; by being present: open to sensitively sharing our own positions, and willing to keep talking to those whom we find it harder to get on with; and by reimagining what the future could look like where we have learned to live with those we find 'challenging', by working towards a relationship of mutual respect, understanding, perhaps forgiveness, openness and honesty. Such changes may lead to reconciliation, one

It's hard to think of ways that public opinion in general, and some politicians in particular, can be reconciled to opening our shores and welcoming refugees again. And it seems even more unlikely that wars such as the one started by Russia against Ukraine will end in peace and reconciliation any time soon. But in small ways at least, perhaps we can be agents of reconciliation in our own situations, or in our communities.

Some years ago, I trained as a mediator, and from

time to time, I'm involved in mediation work with individuals or groups of people who are in conflict. The Conflict Transformation team that I'm part of, aims to help people on both sides of a disagreement work through their issues and look for common ground, in order to bring healing and transformation of the conflict; though we have to be realistic enough to recognise that that won't always happen. On the occasions when the opposing parties eventually reach mutual agreement,

there is almost a sigh of relief. I find that most of the people I try to help don't really want to be 'at war' with others.

The message of Good Friday and Easter Day is that God doesn't want humans to be at odds with one another or alienated from him. God isn't at war with humanity. God loves us all and wants to reconcile us to himself. That's why Jesus died on the cross and rose again on Easter Day... to show us that God's love for us breaks down every wall and barrier, even that of death itself.
