Let your Yes be Yes, and your No be No...

The General Election just around the corner and we've been immersed for several weeks in the political rhetoric of each party's proposals... and in the unending analysis of the news media. With all that's going on, Harold Wilson's often quoted observation "a week is a long time in politics" seems highly relatable. In fact, in our present age of

almost immediate media connection, the same might be said to be true for a day, or even an hour.

Such is the landscape in which politicians seek to communicate their party's priorities and manifesto, it is no doubt hard for them to gain and hold our attention. Amid the soundbites and emotive language employed to catch our ear, it can be exhausting to work out what's really being said.

Of course, the world is a complicated place... there are so many ways in which we

might understand and prioritise the problems that face our country, and even more ways of legitimately tackling those problems. Inevitably there are choices and compromises that need to be made.

With all these conflicting demands, politicians are wary of being 'caught out', so they can be more guarded in what they say. With all the rhetoric, it's unsurprising that we find ourselves longing to hear people 'say what they mean, and mean what they say'.

Among his teaching in the sermon on the mount, Jesus said, "Just say 'yes' and 'no.' When you manipulate words to get your own way, you go wrong." (Matt 5:37 MSG)

Jesus was speaking about the way that people make promises, he said that saying that our speech should be trustworthy and true... always. In other words, there should, be no need for the added complication of promises, just speak the truth. Jesus was advocating for those much-needed attributes of authenticity and integrity.

Sounds great, but none of us are perfect, and in the complexities of life we all struggle with this, not just politicians. Jesus knew that no-one could live that way all the time, but he wasn't setting people up to fail... he was setting a standard to aim towards. It's a standard that all of us long for in the mass of promises in various manifestos

published in the run up to the election.

In the 18th century, the famed preacher John Wesley wrote about the things which he felt were important. It is interesting that these same issues are still hot topics today.

John Wesley's Manifesto

- Reduce the gap between rich people and poor people
- 2. Help everyone to have a job
- 3. Help the poorest, including introducing a living wage
- 4. Offer the best possible education
- Help everyone to feel they can make a difference
- 6. Promote tolerance
- 7. Promote equal treatment for women
- 8. Create a society based on values and not on profits and consumerism
- 9. End all forms of slavery
- 10. Avoid getting into wars
- 11. Share the love of God with everyone
- 12. Care for the environment

Admittedly number II is not in the manifesto of any party, but all the parties would probably claim to be trying to deliver on the others... they just have differing views on how those goals should be achieved.

With the mass of rhetoric in the campaigning it is easy to slip into cynicism, thinking that no political party is going to deliver what we believe is needed. However, most politicians are good people who do, or will (if elected for the first time), work hard to serve their constituents.

So, I would like to encourage us all to take time to read the party manifestos and use their vote in this election. Whether our vote is for the winning candidate or not, when we take part we add weight to the democratic process and we are letting our yes be yes and our no be no.
